Minutes of the Foothills Model T Ford Club Meeting ${\bf January~24^{th},2018~The~Hangar}$

Past President Ross Benedict called the meeting to order at 7:35 pm. 31members attended, including new member Barry Moyer, he has a 1925 Model T Pickup partially restored. Guests for the evening were Joe Nickel and Terry Garvin.

Minutes – Kristen moved the minutes of the November meeting be approved as circulated, seconded by Darren Lloyd. Carried.

Treasurer's Report – Larry presented the finances for November and December and moved the report be adopted as presented, seconded by Bill Price. Carried.

Larry discussed our financial position and reported that the costs of producing paper copies of our newsletter have increased substantially. The Model A club charges an extra \$20.00 to their members if they require a paper copy.

Our SVAA membership is also due for renewal. The membership fees include – Dues for the SVAA, General Liability & Director & Officers Insurance (includes an admin fee) & dues for the NAACC, cost per membership is approximately \$12.56. Total for the year is \$1106. The National Chapter keeps clubs informed of what goes on in other jurisdictions. Ross asked Al Riise what the portion of SVAA clubs that belong to the NAACC. Al said he would have more accurate numbers after the meeting in February held at the Lethbridge Swap Meet. **Motion:** Larry moves that we renew our membership in the SVAA and NAACC and also purchase the insurance. Seconded by Tom Cerkvenac. Carried.

Larry also thanked everyone involved in the tours for keeping expenses low and in check.

Membership – Eileen reported that we now have 89 paid members for 2018, including new member tonight Barry Moyer. Eileen thanked Larry and Darren for their assistance in collecting the remaining memberships for 2018. We still have 6 members we are waiting on. We have 7 new members for 2018. Our membership total for 2017 was 88. We have 44 members with Model T Ford Club of America memberships. Eileen will send a get well card to Val Dawson, she is recovering from a fall on black ice and shattered her knee cap.

Christmas Party report – Eileen reported that we had 29 at the party. We enjoyed a nice meal and had a couple special visitors. The Chapelhow Legion has been booked again for this year's party. The date is December 1st, 2018.

Newsletter – Darren reported that the newsletter is on the website and that he has 8 members signed up to contribute articles to future newsletters. Darren has also found another supplier to produce our newsletter at a much lower cost. He must have the files to her by the 10^{th} of each month to meet deadlines.

Tools – Glen reported that many tools are out, but that they are all accounted for

National Club - Keith reported that the club was doing well. Chris Brancaccio talked about the museum. The MTFCA is trying to purchase a building and are trying to raise \$50,000.00 and are asking for donations. The area around the museum is being cleaned up and generating new interest. There is a Model T on top of the water tower. The Bruce McCauley Library held its grand opening, and was featured in the Vintage Ford. It was suggested that more information about the MTFCA be made available to members in our newsletter, Chris agreed to provide a write up for our newsletter. **Motion:** Keith moves that our club donate \$1000.00 to the Model T Ford Museum. Seconded by Bill Price. Carried.

Tours - Rod reported that he has been talking to Fred Holt about touring around Medicine Hat and Northern Montana. Rod also suggested that we could do a tour around the Ya Ha Tinda Ranch area, but travel would be on mostly gravel roads. Rod is also willing to host the fall colour tour again this year.

Ross asked if anyone had any suggestions for a garage tour possibly in March.

President's tour and Safety Inspection tentatively scheduled for June 2nd and 3rd depending on Harry's plan.


Pete told members of the original 1916 Model T Ford book we found at the Antique Mall in Airdrie.

Lawrence mentioned that Rod Miller from Big Valley had passed away this past week. Rod started the Tool Museum in Big Valley and also had an interest in Model T's. Club members had visited with him many times.

Keith has had vinyl letters or numbers made to go on the roof of his cargo trailer in case of theft. The letters are large enough to go on the roof of the trailer and then can be seen from the air, which may aid in retrieval in the event of theft. Cost of 3 letters is \$22.00.

Kristen and Eileen won the 50-50 draw. Thanks to Larry for picking up the donuts and cookies.

Technical Session Rod presented a slide show and history of the Ya Ha Tinda Ranch. Horses were bred and trained at the ranch to allow remote backcountry travel for park wardens in the mountain National Parks. Patrol of park boundaries and lengthy trail systems were completed by wardens using these well-trained horses. The Ya Ha Tinda ranch celebrated its last 100 year history with a "roundup" of ranch manager families, and retired park wardens in September, 2017 at the ranch along the upper Red Deer River.



This heater is not only of simple construction, but is of such character that it may be quickly applied as a substitute for the customary coupling pipe. For application of the invention to the engines of Ford cars, for example, the water-conducting pipe of the heater will be made of the same diameter and length as the standard Ford coupling pipe, so that the complete heater may be readily substituted for the removed coupling pipe. In the engines of certain other cars, a long flexible hose section is used as the coupling pipe, and in such arrangements, the heater may be readily substituted for such flexible hose coupling.

The heater is intended for what may be designated as emergency use, that is, for use in very cold weather to keep the cooling water of the engine in circulation and at such temperature far above the freezing point that the engine will start easily, even when the car is left in-a very cold garage. The heater is designed to be readily coupled to any of the local wires of the lighting. or heating system.


The complete electrical heater made up of the various parts described, when assembled, is a very compact, simple and self-contained device capable of application to the engine of 'a motor propelled vehicle in the same manner that the customary or any suitable simple coupling "ipe" would be connected




