#### Minutes of Foothills Model T Meeting October 27th, 2021, at The Hangar

President Darren Lloyd called the meeting to order at 7:10pm with 22members in attendance.

**Minutes:** Minutes of last Zoom meeting May 26<sup>th</sup>, 2021, were distributed in the newsletter, no errors or omissions noted, moved by Chris Brancaccio, seconded by Tom Cerkvenac. Carried.

**Treasurer:** Larry reported on the September financials. He moved his report be accepted as presented seconded by Harry. Carried.

**Membership:** Ross reported on behalf of Eileen that he was taking membership dues. He also asked if there was anyone in the club that could assist with membership for a while. The club roster can be emailed out as an Excel spreadsheet as well as a PDF which can be printed on a standard 8-1/2" x 11" page

**Newsletter:** Ross has published newsletters during Covid and requests that members continue to send articles, sometimes he has more than enough material and sometimes he is short. The MTFCA has asked for a write up of our club history (200 - 350 words), Ross suggested the articles from the newsletter and Rod's write up on the website. Kristen will work on this.

**Website:** A mailing list similar to the MTFCA Forum could be setup to allow club members to post messages. Possible list categories could include tours, executive discussions, etc. Members would need to be approved by the list administrators in order to join the list.

**Tools:** Glen gave reviewed which tools were on loan, to verify that his list matched what members have signed out. The inventory of tools can be found on the website.

**MTFCA**: Chris reported that the last meeting he attended was October 2, 2021, by Zoom. The winter meeting is in St. Louis the third weekend in March. The summer tour will be held in Wisconsin June  $19 - 24^{th}$ , 2022. There is a challenge match from November  $1 - 9^{th}$  donations made to the Model T Ford Club of America Museum will be doubled. Chris presented two certificates from the Model T Ford Club of America in recognition of our  $50^{th}$  Anniversary and  $50^{th}$  Year Charter Chapter.

**Tours:** Tom reported a great tour to Rocky Mountain House in celebration of the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary. Tom also thanked Les & Karin Schubert for the great fall colour tour they organized and hosted. Kristen and Peter reported that the included wildlife was a hit. They watched a moose that had





crossed the highway, and wild horses were up close during the Rocky Mountain House tour. So glad the events were able to take place with Covid as the club celebrated its 50<sup>th</sup> year.

**Old Business:** Shirts – First Impressions has finally received clothing stock, but now getting the graphic corrected and refined. The graphic used was the club-restored Reynold Museum's 1911 Touring. Part of the issue has been staffing changes and shortages due to the pandemic. Larry is following up regularly to get this project completed.

Decals – Rod reported this has also been a slow process due to the same issues expressed by Larry. The decals have been printed in blocks of 50 with three designs. "Celebrating 50 years" with a T graphic; with just the T graphic, and the original decal with no T added. See page 12 for examples.

Motion: Give choice of two stickers to each member family on the roster – Chris Brancaccio, second by Ross Carried.

Discussion: what will we do with any remaining? Could we have jackets made with one of these designs, and what would be the minimum order, Larry will investigate. The stickers cost about \$3.00 each and it was suggested that the club sell the extras. Distribution to members was not discussed and a motion to sell extras was not made at this time.

**New Business**: Ross discussed a program being offered by the MTFCA for youth memberships. It's a fantastic way to generate interest into the club. Motion by Ross that club pay any FMTFC member family with youth (7-17) first-year membership in the MTFCA Model T Explorer Youth Club Presently (\$18.00 US) second by Peter. Carried.

Chris reported that the Museum has switched insurance to Hagerty. It was suggested that the MTFCA discuss insurance with Hagerty for younger members. Motion: Chris moved that the club donate \$250 US to the Museum during the challenge match running from Nov  $1-9^{th}$ . Seconded by Ross. There was much discussion on the amount of the donation and whether a donation was the best use of our funds, or if we could better utilize the funds in our club. The amount decided was the \$250.00 US. The vote was tied four votes for and four votes against, with the majority of those attending the meeting abstaining so, the motion was defeated. Larry suggested we revisit this donation next year.

Darren suggested a Christmas gathering of some sort at a restaurant such as Swiss Chalet. Asked members to think about it and we will discuss again at the November meeting. The election of officers will also be held in November, and we will need volunteers to run the election. Meeting adjourned at 8:02

Open cars supplied with gas lamps, horn, windshield and top as standard but could be had without this equipment (as in 1910) for \$80 less, early in 1911. By about April 1911 the open cars were sold fully equipped only. 1915 was similar to 1914 but now had metal cowl section that tapered down to the hood. The windshield was now upright and folded to the rear at the center. The hood was aluminum, but had louvers on the side panels. Rear fenders were curved to follow the wheel outline and had no crown. The 1916 saw the brass trim on lamps discontinued. The new all-black style (1917 models) appeared in August 1916 but these were considered 1917 models.

The 1917 body was similar to 1916 but fenders were crowned and curved. Radiator shell was now black. Until late 1920, open car bodies were built similar to the 1917 bodies. The 1919 saw an added 90 lbs. for a starter, and 45 lbs. for demountable rims and tire carrier on open cars. Starter and rims were standard on closed cars. In 1920 Starter was an option on the open cars at \$75. Weight 95 lbs. Demountable rims were an additional \$25. Weight 55 lbs.

In 1921 a new body for the Touring had been announced in June 1920. Similar to the earlier style, the rear section was now three pieces (instead of five), with no vertical seam on the rear side quarter panel. Seats were lower and had higher backs. In 1922 an instrument panel was supplied on all cars. A blanking plate was used to cover the hole where the ammeter would be, on the non-electric models. The Centerdoor sedans had solid roof panel, latch-type window lifts, and metal over the door and window posts instead of the painted wood seen before. The Coupe was modified to now have the latch-type window raisers. In addition, the previously exposed window and door sills were now covered with metal, as on the Sedan. The FORDOR SEDAN: Introduced in December 1922, with an aluminum body.





The 1923 Ford line. All these models had the "low" radiator. Note that the Center-Door Sedan continues but the new Fordor Sedan is added to the line. The "high" radiator cars as well as the new Coupe and Tudor Sedan were 1924 models. The touring car shown is the very early model. The shape of the top was given a gentle curve downward at the rear after the first 100,000 models. 1924 Same models as the later 1923 (which Ford referred to as 1924s). The Fordor sedan now had steel lower panels although aluminum continued in the upper sections; doors on the closed cars changed to steel during the year, eliminating the wood framework used in the previous doors. Cowl vent were on the closed cars. A new tail lamp/license plate assembly appeared during the year and became the standard through 1927. Four-dip engine pan was introduced in 1924.

The 1925 was essentially the same as the 1924 models, but a number of changes were made in the cars. Balloon tires, redesigned fenders, and other minor styling changes appeared. The C-Cab and Closed Cab bodies were now available for the truck chassis, along with a number of rear body options. These continued with little change until the end of Model T production in 1927. The Roadster-Pickup was added about April 1925. In 1926 brought all steel construction except for the Fordor Sedan. The Fordor was steel over wood frame, a





modification of the 1925 body. There was completely new styling; colors offered on closed cars although black seemed to continue in some production. There were larger and heavier fenders and running boards. The Touring and Runabout given doors on driver's side for the first time in U.S. production. New chassis frame with longer front and rear cross members. And for the first time we saw larger rear wheel brakes

The 1927 models were similar to the 1926 models. Black wire wheels became standard on the closed cars late in the year but were optional until that time. The Roadster-Pickup could be provided with the spare rim rack on the side. Starter and 21-inch demountable wheels were standard on all cars. Starter was optional on the truck. Wire wheels were an option but became standard equipment on closed cars at during the last several months of production. Pickup body for Runabout, \$25.00. Ford's automobile production ended May 26, 1927, but trucks and engines continued for some time.




