








Here is the cover of The Vintage Ford September - October 1971 where we were welcomed into the fold.

A short story about my friend Roy Gale

"Hey, you're not old enough."

It was well over 50 years ago that I met Roy Gale for the first time. He owned a gas station and tractor wrecking business on the #1 Highway in the town of Dunmore, Alberta, just east of Medicine Hat. I went there one day as a young boy with my dad. My dad needed a chain coupler off a Massey 55 tractor. Roy gave my dad permission to salvage the parts he needed from a tractor he had and as Dad proceeded to work at pulling the chain coupler off the tractor, I started running around all over the wrecking yard. I was climbing all over the old tractors and other machinery. Roy caught me doing this and told me, "Hey - you're not old enough to be climbing around on all those tractors. You are going to get hurt." Years passed and life went on for the both of us, but then around 2011 Roy and I met again at a car show. I had taken a Model T there and Roy took an interest in it. We had a great visit that day. He told me that his father owned a Ford Model T in the 1920's but his dad never let him drive it. His dad said "Hey - you're not old enough." Roy then told me that he never learned how to drive a Model T because of what his dad said. I offered Roy a chance that day to learn how to drive a Model T. He immediately accepted the offer and over the next year Roy and I became the best of friends. He not only learned how to drive a Model T, but he also assembled a car for himself out of old parts, all the while telling me many stories of his life and events of years gone by. He would usually start these stories by saying things like "Remember when" or "Do you know so and so?" Or "Remember that house or business on that street." I would often reply "Sorry Roy, I don't." He would laugh and say "Hey - you're not old enough."

Ten years have passed since I taught Roy to drive a Model T. In those years I heard Roy having conversations and telling stories to many, many people. They are genuinely interested but some are not sure what he is talking about., so, he finishes up the story and then says "Hey - I guess you're not old enough." I just shake my head and smile to myself. It has become a small private





joke now between Roy and me. Roy gave up his driver's license when he turned 99 years old (2019) but still found ways to come out to my home to visit and see his beloved Model T Ford. Roy celebrated his 101st birthday in June.



On the 20th of July, Roy came out to visit with another friend of ours, Donny Hamilton. Donny and I went to high school together and Roy and Donny's dad were best friends for years until Donny's dad passed away. During that visit I got Roy's Model T out of the garage, and we all went for a drive. I live in the country so there are lots of fields and prairie trails to drive on, so

Roy was able to get behind the wheel of his car again. He drove his car for a bit and then I took over for the rest of the drive. We had a wonderful time just driving back trails and reliving the memories prior to Covid-19. On one particular trail Roy pointed to the east and told Donny that when he was fourteen, he used to ride his bike out from Medicine Hat on a trail and pick rocks in that field for a farmer. Donny stated that he has only known that area as a municipal park and never a farmer's field. Roy looked at me, winked, and said "Hey - you're not old enough." I got a tear in my eye at that moment but just shook my head and smiled at them. We arrived back at my house with everyone in great spirits. Roy commented on how wonderful it was to be able to go out for a ride in his car again and how much he appreciated the day. He decided to give me his Model T Ford and I will cherish this car dearly. When I asked him why he wanted me to have it his reply was "Hey - you are finally old enough!" Again, with a tear in my eye, I just shook my head and grinned.

Those of us that headed north from Doug and Phyllis' missed out on the added tour,




but we did succeed to ford a creek (tightening our wooden spokes) and arrived safely back at Les and Karin's to load up and head home.
