Harvey Callfas offered this sky blue 1978 Lincoln Continental Mark V (400 in 3 V8, 54,000 miles) at \$8,000. 1930 Model A coupe in the typical 1980s colour scheme of straw over brown was said to "run good" and could have been yours for \$20,000.

This 1934 Austin 7 'Box' Saloon had a 4-cylinder engine of 747 cc (46 in3) capacity and a 4-speed transmission. The sign cautioned 'Serious Inquiries Only,' which, in my experience, usually means "I'm hoping for 'way more than it's worth".













Sadly, this 1:40 PM Saturday photo by Robb Wolfe shows the north hall all but empty other than vendors and leftovers. Still, whether sales were strong, weak, or in-between, it was great to see and visit with so many old car friends again after a *very* long two-year hiatus!

Recharging the magnets in your T, by Robb Wolff

Jack up one rear wheel and push the emergency brake lever all the way forward.


Remove the Mag post.



Take the key out of the ignition **key** so it won't fall into the transmission when you remove the transmission inspection cover.



The club owns and here Peter used the club's ECCT to check the mag output before and after zapping the magnets.





magnet retaining screws are parallel with the ground. Hint: you can rotate the engine both directions by turning the elevated rear wheel. Don't worry about the north/south pole orientation (polarity).









You will need a sharpened rod or a punch that will pass through the Mag plug opening and make contact with the solder terminal at the top of the mag coil. Wrap some tape around the rod so that it won't short to the hogshead.






Connect three 12V batteries in series.

Attach booster cables to the battery terminals.

Attach one cable clamp to the rod and make sure the rod has good contact with the mag ring.



Club tools, contact Glen McDonald to arrange a pickup.















Know, tap or slap the other clamp to a clean spot on the hogshead. Make a solid contact for up to **one** second. Six to eight good contacts should be enough to recharge the magnets.

Don't be surprised if there is a loud bang when you make contact. The bottom of the mag coil ring will be hitting the magnets and the crank shaft will be moving forward.

NB: If the gas tank is located anywhere near the hogshead, be very, very careful not to touch a battery cable clamp to the tank. The high current will quickly blow a hole in the tank and, well, you can guess the outcome.



MAP TO ART'S SHOP IN LACOMBE






