Great Uncle Al's Thumb by Greg Lillico

This is a true story about my Great Uncle Al. Who was Dad's mother's sister's husband. (Al Greenhalgh, in a Model T delivery van he had just serviced, is shown on the right.) Uncle Al spent several of his early years as a mechanic for the Star Garage in Vancouver. There,



he serviced a variety of vehicles, including a fleet of Model T delivery or "pie wagons." Somewhere, around 1921, he had just finished overhauling a rear axle assembly on one of these Model Ts. With the wheels on, he and the apprentice rolled the unit into place. Uncle Al positioned the driveshaft and held universal joint in position with his left hand. The apprentice sat on the floor, behind the car, with his feet on the rear axle, ready to push it forward. Anyone who knows the anatomy of this part of a model T, is aware that the edges of the bell housing for the universal joint are very sharp! Uncle Al ordered, "when I say shove"... the words had barely left his lips when the apprentice shoved with all his might. The end result was that while the universal met it's mark, Uncle Al's thumb was severed just above the knuckle. I can only imagine the excitement and probably a barrage of profanity that ensued! He picked the thumb up off the garage floor, jammed it into place, and it was off to the doctors. Upon examination, the doctor said it was a waste of time and refused to reattach the severed member. Uncle Al told me that he strongly suggested to the doctor that he better try! The task was completed, and it did "take"! Some months later, Uncle Al found himself down on False Creek with some friends. They were building a wharf. A deft blow of a large hammer missed it's mark, smashing poor Al's healing thumb! This must've caused some internal damage, as a small piece of fingernail began to grow out the side of his thumb. It was like that for the rest of his life. I still remember his left hand with the bulbous thumb resting on the steering wheel of his car as I was a passenger. I was told this story when I was quite young. To this day, I still get the shivers when I see the front end of a model T driveshaft!

A Steve Jelf * suggestion

If using a flap. you have to put
the tube and the flap into the
tire with just enough air to keep
the tube from collapsing.

Installing the tire is easier with
the rim on the car than on the
ground. With the stem installed
in the hole at the bottom, let
the car down just enough to
keep the stem in the hole.

Starting at the bottom, pry on



both sides of the tire together. Use powder. You're on the right track with long irons.




